Lord God, I thank You that You are patient and have shown much patience with me. I want to ask You that You help me grow in patience too. I recognise I cannot do this by myself, but that I need the help of Your Holy spirit. Please make me more like You and help me to learn how to wait when I don't feel like it. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Proverbs 16:32 (NIV)

The Bible is abundantly clear. God wants us to be patient. I feel as if I have never given this the consideration it deserves. Why is patience so important to God?

We need to learn patience partially because there are things outside of our control, beyond the limits of our ability. We need to learn how to wait well on the things which will be given to us, either by other people or by God. When we patiently wait, we show that we trust in His promises.

But God Himself is also patient. That's amazing when we think of the fact that there is nothing that's beyond His power to control. He can do whatever He wants, when He wants it! So why should God Himself exercise patience?

I think the answer lies in the fact that God wants the best for everybody. For example, He waits for people to repent, as He does not want anyone to perish, so He gives the world more time before Jesus returns and the final day of judgement arrives. He holds back because it is best for others.

In Isaiah Chapter 30, God says He wants to help Israel, even though, in their stubbornness, they are refusing His help. He explains that this means they will have even more troubles. But this is not the end. He also says that He will patiently wait until they are ready to trust in Him.

'Therefore the Lord waits to be gracious to you, and therefore he exalts himself to show mercy to you. For the Lord is a God of justice; blessed are all those who wait for him' (Isaiah 30:18, ESV).

In the Summer edition of *Eternity* magazine Pete Greig wrote a piece on prayer and suffering. Pete was the founder of the *24/7 Prayer* movement that has been a non-stop prayer movement for 25 years. Yet behind the success of the movement Pete's own prayer life struggled when his wife was diagnosed with a brain tumour. God seemed silent as Pete prayed for his wife. He started to realise that the only way forward was "the path of discipleship, which is to embrace the full Easter experience ... the discipleship journey must not only embrace the resurrection of Easter Sunday, but the silence of Holy Saturday and the agony of Good Friday. In those three days together, we find a balanced faith." he says.. Despite our experiences "only Jesus Christ and him crucified that makes sense of the pain and the brokenness and the vulnerability of life". Greig encourages, "God's not insecure as to whether we or others believe in him. Our job is not to do his PR. It's to be truthful about our experience and cling to him."
